

LEARNING LIFE LESSONS FROM HOMELESS KIDS

At our recent Donor and Volunteer Party, volunteer Arielle Loeb spoke about her experience working with children at the Red Door and the impact that they have had on her life.

"Last night, I saw Payam Akhavan, renowned UN prosecutor and human rights scholar, speak at the Massey Lecture. At the end, a child asked a question about what kids could do to help with human rights. His response: 'Everything. You have your whole life ahead of you. Help the kid who is being bullied or who is alone. And every morning, think about the end of your life and what you want to look back on and be proud of.'

I think it's a lesson we can all take to heart. And though Payam articulated that idea when he answered the child's question, it was that same idea that motivated me to do more. I got involved with the Red Door Shelter because I wanted to give back, contribute to society – really, the same reasons many of us are supporters.

I found my way to the Red Door specifically because I wanted to give back in the community where I live, which is Leslieville. Given where the need was, I ended up at the women's shelter. And I haven't looked back. Once a week, I get to hang out with about eight 6-12 year old kids while the moms have their peer-support meetings.

I feel like I'm the lucky one. I get to spend a couple of hours a week with kids who invariably teach me about what truly matters. We play games – connect 4 is a popular one. Jenga. They take much pleasure when I'm the one who makes the tower fall. Peta-Gaye, the truly incredible



staff member, organizes craft activities. Slime making. Painting. We decorated gingerbread cookies in which the gingerbread became the carrier for more frosting than any of us could ever imagine eating.

So who are these kids? Kaleb and his sister Aleia who had such a love of life despite whatever harrowing situation they had come from. It was Aleia who was quick to remind us that beauty comes from within. There was Rana who saw snow for the first time, having moved here from Afghanistan last summer. We read together occasionally and I will tell you there is nothing guite like seeing her eyes light up as she powered through her

books. And she made my eyes light up when I would walk in and she would give me a hug.

I'd be lying if I told you there weren't moments or comments that were heart breaking. There was one conversation that still stands out in my mind – somehow the topic of clothes came up and one of the kids asked why they always got used clothes. Why no new clothes. It wasn't fair.

It might be easy to say 'he should be thankful for what he has.' However, hearing these words struck me because it was a stark reminder that at the end of the day, these are just kids in a situation they didn't choose. Uprooted from whatever life they knew. If for a couple of hours a week, I can play connect 4 with them or play tag in the park, then for a couple of hours they can just be kids and hopefully for a moment, forget whatever else they might be dealing with.

These may be small gestures, but to quote Dr. Seuss from *The Lorax*, 'unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better. It's not.'"

OUR NEW SHELTER IS UNDERWAY

In October last year we began relocating our family shelter so we can house homeless families while a new family shelter is built back at our original location. Today we are settled at our interim location on Gerrard St. E. and construction of the new shelter is well underway and on track to be completed by December 2018.



The Community of Hope campaign continues to raise the \$3,000,000 needed for equipment, furnishings and services at the new shelter. To date \$2,400,000 has been donated. The E. & G. Odette foundation and P. & L. Odette foundation together have generously pledged to match gifts up to \$500,000, and there is \$155,000 remaining in this matching gift challenge.

We are looking forward to opening the doors to our new shelter in Leslieville where we first started sheltering homeless families in 1982. The modern, purpose-built shelter will be the healing sanctuary that homeless families need and will enable residents to build bright futures, with your support.
