A woman's journey to the Red Door is not an easy one. Facing abuse – physical and emotional - can prevent a woman from finding the refuge she needs. It's a courageous step forward when a woman knocks at the Red Door.

Surrounded by a community of caring people like you, the Red Door became Laura's safe haven – a place where she and her children could thrive and heal from their past.

At the Red Door, we're honoured to be a part of each family's journey as they move towards independence. With you by our side, we can work towards ending the cycles of violence and poverty, together, through advocacy and empowering our residents to rebuild their lives.

This beautiful piece of artwork was a gift to the Red Door from Laura. In January 2022, she completed the Red Door's two-year Outreach Program. Now, her family is living independently, free from violence.


Laura used symbolism in her art to highlight different moments of her journey. For example, the fireplace represents the warmth and care she received from staff at the Red Door.

"I arrived cold and lonely. My abuser had deprived me of family, of friends. At the Red Door, the staff gave me sincere friendship. I almost forgot what that felt like."

The erupting volcano to Laura symbolizes the danger of her situation, the violence and abuse she experienced from her partner. It became too much, and she had to leave.

"It's the danger of a situation we think will never happen to us. But the lava – it runs after us, hurts us when it touches our skin. It damages our body and soul, leaving us with deep scars."

The waterfall depicts the tranquility she found while staying at the Red Door. The sense of peace that rushed over her knowing everything will be okay.

The Red Door participated in its third annual Coldest Night of the Year on February 26, and it was a huge success! Together, we surpassed our goal of \$75,000 and raised an incredible \$99,219!

Braving the cold, 188 walkers and 41 teams bundled up to walk to support the women, children and families staying at the Red Door. Although we went virtual for a second year in a row, we're fortunate to have a dedicated Leslieville community determined to make a difference in the lives of homeless families.

Madeline Coffell, the eight-year-old team captain of The Good Deeds Club, along with 11 of her classmates walked in their second CNOY. They raised \$3,775 for the Red Door! Wow!
